Full and half-day guided tours can be organised to visit the numerous tiny islands just a short boat ride from the harbour.


Visitors can experience a real flavour of the surrounding seabird, wildlife, flora, history and culture which makes the North West Scottish Highlands so unique




















A visit to the Unesco-endorsed Assynt Geopark affords tantalising views of one of the last great wildernesses of Europe. This outdoor paradise offers the opportunity to experience a flavour of over 2000m² of stunning mountain ranges, pristine sandy beaches, deep lochs, ancient settlements and thriving communities. The turf-roofed Knockan Crag Visitor Centre is a great starting point to learn more about this precious area.






Ardvreck Castle and Calda House

80 km return trip


In the heart of medieval Assynt lie the ruined castle and burial vault of the Macleods of Assynt, the remains of the grand Calda House of their successors the Mackenzies and the old Inchnadamph parish church which contains a wealth of historical information. 3km south-east are the Bone Caves of Inchnadamph which when excavated revealed the bones of brown and polar bears, arctic fox and lynx, all of which inhabited this part of Scotland 11,000 years ago.













Full and half-day trips are available to visit numerous visitor attractions and beauty spots south of Ullapool. All journeys take advantage of the majestic scenery, deep lochs and mountainous peaks which characterise this landscape.










Leckmelm Arboretum

8 km return trip

Planted in the 1880s and restored in 1984, this beautiful sheltered oasis is just minutes from Ullapool village and teems with rare species of azalea, rhododendron, alpine plants and specimen trees.








Lael Forest Walk

32 km return trip

of even limited experience. Over 200 well-identified tree species such as Giant Redwoods, Cricket Bat Willows and Lawson Cypress can be spotted and there are plenty of benches and resting spots along the way.





At 60m deep and less than 10m at the lip, this easily accessible "slot gorge" was formed by glacial melt water and is barely 100m from two A roads.

Sir John Fowler (later architect of the Forth Bridge) built a small suspension bridge to afford views of the 45m high Falls of Measach.

A separate viewing platform allows visitors even closer access to the dramatic views.

Gruinard Sands

120 km return trip

This is a spectacular drive alongside the dramatic and wild coastline of Gruinard's three beautiful beaches with their clear waters, fine, pinkish sands and rock pools.

The trip is a perfect stop-off point on a day trip to Inverewe Gardens.







Inverewe Gardens

160 km return trip

This lush tropical oasis set amidst the bare rock of the rugged Highlands is regarded as one of Scotland's most beautiful gardens. This full-day trip for garden lovers includes stop-off points en-route including Leckmelm Arboretum, the Falls of Measach and Corrieshalloch Gorge, Lael Forest and Gruinard Sands. Despite the northerly latitude, colourful and exotic plants flourish here thanks to the Gulf Stream's warm currents and 100 acres of specially planted wooded shelter.















142 km return trip
